**Registered Apprenticeship** was celebrated at all levels of government during National Apprenticeship Week (NAW). Leaders from the local, state, and national levels issued proclamations and attended career fairs, conferences, graduations, signing ceremonies, webinars, and other events to showcase that Registered Apprenticeship truly is the Superhighway to Good Jobs!

#### **EVENT HIGHLIGHTS**

- President Joseph R. Biden issued
   a National Apprenticeship Week
   Proclamation highlighting the impact
   of Registered Apprenticeship as a pathway to good-paying jobs. Registered Apprenticeship helps today's workforce develop the skills needed for the careers of the future. The proclamation highlights Registered Apprenticeship as a critical strategy in the Administration's efforts to modernize our infrastructure, build clean energy technologies, and address cybersecurity threats through the Investing in America Agenda.
- Vice President Kamala Harris joined hundreds of union workers at Pipefitters 537 in Boston, MA, to present remarks highlighting Registered Apprenticeship programs. Harris focused on the Biden Administration's efforts to promote good union jobs through Registered Apprenticeship that improves wages and working conditions for all workers.

increase opportunities for underserved populations, and bring awareness to other career seekers who may be interested in becoming apprentices.



■ The Office of Apprenticeship announced the first national Youth Apprenticeship Week (YAW), May 5–11, 2024, which will highlight the benefits and value of Registered Apprenticeship opportunities for youth, ages 16–24. YAW provides stakeholders with a chance to show how Registered Apprenticeship can create a sustainable pipeline of skilled workers and allow youth to earn competitive wages while obtaining the relevant training and experience to start their careers.

• The U.S. Department of Labor <u>announced</u> the availability of \$98 million in funding for **YouthBuild** to support the delivery of pre-apprenticeships in high-demand industries, including construction, healthcare, hospitality, and information technology. YouthBuild is a community-based pre-apprenticeship program that provides job training and educational opportunities for youth ages 16–24 who left school without a secondary diploma.





# **Registered Apprenticeship for Youth**

**Registered Apprenticeship** and pre-apprenticeships combine work and learning opportunities for young people ages 16–24 to jumpstart their careers.

During the event, IALR and SVHEC highlighted the benefits of youth apprenticeship and celebrated the students, employers, and education partners who are making apprenticeships work in rural southern Virginia. Six SVHEC Career Tech Academy students who began youth apprenticeship programs with local employers were recognized.

# Registered Apprenticeship in New and Emerging Industries

Industry partners throughout the country hosted events showcasing the importance of Registered Apprenticeship in addressing critical workforce needs in high-growth industries such as Advanced Manufacturing, Cybersecurity, Healthcare, and IT.

They are one of the first organizations in the nation to specialize in adopting Registered Apprenticeship programs to serve young adults with disabilities transitioning to full-time employment.

• UW Health hosted a graduation on Nov. 19, 2023, for a class of 20 certified medical assistant apprentices. Since 2013, apprentices in Wisconsin have increased by nearly 70%. UW Health hosted all 20 graduates of the Medical Assistant Apprenticeship Program registered through the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development. The program was created to address a shortage in health-care workers. It also reduces educational and professional barriers for people who want to work in healthcare.

■ Apprenticeship Ambassador WRTP | BIG STEP of South Central Wisconsin and the Building Trades Council of South Central Wisconsin hosted an Apprenticeship Career Day & Fair at the Plumbers Local 75 Training Center in Madison. WRTP | BIG STEP's President & CEO Lindsay Blumer was joined by Governor Tony Evers, Bureau of Apprenticeship Standards Director David Polk, Dane County Executive Joe Parisi, and graduates of WRTP | BIG STEP currently working in apprenticeships.






# Women in Registered Apprenticeship

We assist in program development, facilitate connections with community-based intermediaries, offer technical assistance, and identify investment opportunities to help them achieve their objectives. This year marked the celebration of the third annual National Women in Apprenticeship Day on Thursday, Nov. 16, 2023.

For members of the military or veterans, Registered Apprenticeship is a unique and rewarding pathway to develop technical skills while transitioning into civilian employment.


